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MBTA Wins Suit Against Milton

Judge Frank W. Tomasello of Suffolk Superior dismissed on Monday a suit by the Town of Milton to block the MBTA rapid transit ex-tension from Ashmont Station to Mattapan,

William H. White, chair-man of Milton selectmen, said later "we are going to appeal this to a higher court."

The extension would en-able the MBTA to store its rapid transit cars in Matta-pan instead of Cambridge, thus clearing the Bennet-street yard near Harvard sq.

This would pave the way or the building of the Kenway for nedy Library complex at Bennett street.

In their suit, Milton offi-cials contended that the MBTA had not given adequate notice of its plans and had not complied with a requirement that it consult with the State Department of Commerce and Develop-ment and the Metropolitan A rea Planning Council (MAPC).

Judge Tomasello ruled that the \$12.8 million exten-sion plan was "duly ap-proved by the MBTA Advi-sory Board" on Feb. 29, 1968, and was based upon trans-portation plans adopted by Public Works Public Works.

He further ruled that the extension was prepared by the MBTA in consultation with the Department of Commerce and Development and the MAPC. White said he feels the ex-tension is "an absolute waste of taxpayers' money and is only replacing an already

only replacing an already existing trolley line. "They could do better to use the money to build lines where none exist now," he added added.

Robert D. O'Leary, Milton town counsel, said the governor discussed the matter with the MBTA in great de-tail, but after Feb. 29 "I don't believe he discussed it with anyone from the Town of Milton."
