MBTA Seeks To Extend Line

A request for approval of the planned extension of the MBTA's Cambridge to Ashmont rapid transit line to Mattapan will be made to the authority's board of directors today (Feb. 9) according to MBTA general manager Leo

J. Cusick.
According to the plan proposed by Mr. Cusick, the exist-ing high speed trolley line running from Ashmont to Mattapan would be eliminated. In its place, the MBTA will extendits rapid transit line from Ashmont to Mattapan with stons at Butler street in Dorchester, Central avenue in Milton and a terminal

in Mattapan.

The plan calls for the elimination of the present trolley stops at Cedar Grove, Milton, Valley Road and Capen street-the last three being in Milton.

According to Cusick's plan, the Central avenue stop on the new line would be on an overpass, so not to disrupt automobile traffic in that area and an underpass will be built at the present Capen street station, again to ease traffic congestion.

The facilities at the new terminal at Mattapan will include a new station, a main-tenance and repair shop facility with a car wash and a cleaning unit, a small control tower, a new fare control operation, and of the trains.

The storage yard at Mattapan proposed under the new plan solves the problem of where to build the car yards which must be moved from their present Cambridge site to make room for the start of construction of the John F. Kennedy Memorial Library.
