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NASA Space Science Unit To Visit Public Schools

On September 16, 17 and 18, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Space Science Unit will visit Milton to present the Spacemobile Lecture-Demonstration Program to public school pupils in grades five through twelve.

Use will be made of simple experiments and scale models space hardware to explain the basic scientific principles applied in the exploration of

The program will last approximately 60 minutes and will include discussions and demonstrations of aeronautics, rocketry, propulsion systems, satellites, probes, orbits, commun-

ications, human factors and manned spacecraft.

The NASA representative who will conduct the program and, when time permits, visit science classes, is Mr. Minot H. Parker. He is presently a Space Science Demonstrator at the University of New Hampshire assigned to serve the Educational Programs Office of the Electronics Research Center in Cambridge.

Milton GI, 22 Killed With Infantry Forces

Army Sgt. William T. Cloney III, 22, of 30 Lantern lane, was killed in action in Vietnam Saturday where he was serving with the infantry Special Forces near Cambodia. His parents Mr. and Mrs. William T. Cloney of Milton and Scituate were notified Sunday.

His father, William T. Cloney Jr., is director of the Boston Athletic Association's Indoor Games and the annual B.A.A. Marathon. He was sports editor of the Boston Post from 1953 to 1956 and is presently South division chairman of the United

Sgt Cloney was born in Boston and lived in Milton and Scituate all his life. A graduate of St. Sebastian Country Day School in Newton where he was a varsity tennis player, he at-

tended Northeastern University before joining the Army in July

As a member of the Milton at member of the Mitton Little League, he was an all-star shortstop. He was also a member of the Scituate Harbor Yacht Club's tennis team, win-ning the men's senior doubles championship at 12 years of age. He also was a member of the club's swimming team. He trained at Ft. Jackson,

S.C., and at Fort Benning, Ga., in the army and was named the

top of his non-commissioned officers class in leadership.
After Special Forces training
at Fort Lewis, Wash., he left
for Vietnam six weeks ago.

Besides his parents, Sgt. Cloney is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Kathleen Dodge of Omaha, Neb., Mrs. Mary Eliz-abeth Benjes of Rowayton, Conn., and Mrs. Martha Hamilton of Houston, Texas.
